"The Legendary King"

Resource Summary: The lesson idea(s) that follow, have been designed to be utilized after a viewing of one of the fourteen tales entitled *The Legendary King* in the film West of the West: Tales from California's Channel Islands. The segment is approximately 14 minutes long and tells the story of Herbert and Elizabeth Lester, who moved from the California mainland in 1930 to San Miguel Island where they lived for 12 years and raised two young daughters. Their story provides myriad opportunities to inspire student writing in all three of the writing genres — Opinion, Informative/Explanatory, and Narrative.

Resource Details:

The teacher will explain that the students will be watching a segment of the film **West of the West: Tales from California's Channel Islands**, which tells the story of Herbert and Elizabeth Lester, who moved from the California mainland in 1930 to San Miguel Island where they lived for 12 years and raised two young daughters. After viewing this segment, the teacher will facilitate a discussion during, which the student will generate a list of the pros and cons of living on an island; the students' ideas will be recorded on chart paper.

The teacher may then share Barbara Cooney's *Island Boy*, about a family who settled on a small island off the coast of Maine, followed by a discussion of the differences between living year round on an island in northern Maine versus an island in southern California. The teacher may also share the poem, "If Once you have Slept on an Island" by Rachel Field with a follow up discussion of the poet's perspective on island life.

Students will then be given options for culminating writing activities:

- Write a diary entry as if you were one of the Lester girls living on San Miguel Island.
- Write a letter pretending to be one of the Lester daughters to a friend or relative on the mainland.
- Write an opinion essay explaining why you would like to or not like to grow up on an island.
- Write a letter to a student living on an island in Maine. (There are a number of islands with one room schoolhouses in Maine with whom a teacher could arrange for pen pals) telling them about the Lesters and the Channel Islands.
