"Once Upon a Time" (Sa Hi Pa Ca)

Resource Summary:

Using the video clip "Once Upon a Time," students will study general Chumash culture, paying close attention to how the groups utilized the natural resources around them. Expanding into online information, students will research specific tools and technology mentioned and shown in the video clip and how they were made using the resources available to them. Students will also explain how resources collected changed over time as different Chumash technologies advanced.

Resource Details:

- 1. Students watch the "Once Upon a Time" video clip from West of the West.
- 2. While watching the clip, have students take note of the natural resources that the Chumash used in their everyday lives for food, tools, etc.
- 3. Using the Internet as an additional resource, have students research the composition and use of several different tools that were mentioned or shown in the video clip.
- 4. From the list, students make a claim as to which tool was the most significant tool and how the environment made that tool possible. Students provide evidence

- from the video clip and their research.
- 5. Using another website, students determine what food was gathered and how it was gathered over several time periods in Chumash culture. Students then make a claim based on evidence on how their food gathering methods improved with better resources and technology.
- 6. To wrap up the activity, students make a claim for how Chumash group behavior (making tools, gathering food/resources) allowed them to better survive, reproduce, and expand their populations.
